ESS reception centres/resiliency centres

Reception Centres provide immediate assistance with accommodations, food, and medical or prescription support. Please call Emergency Social Services at 1-800-585-9559 to confirm availability or find out about other locations where Emergency Social Services may be available. Read the evacuation order for your area to find out the location of the nearest reception centre.

Resiliency Centres and Information Centres provide information, government and non-government resources, insurance advice, counselling, and other supports for wildfire evacuees.

Evacuee registration/finding people

All evacuees should register with the [Red Cross](#), even if aid is not required by evacuees. This allows family and friends to know the whereabouts and safety of loved ones, and allows the Red Cross to contact people directly as more info and assistance becomes available.

Evacuees should also register in person at an ESS Reception Centre (see list above) if they are in need of immediate assistance with accommodations, food, and medical or prescription support. If evacuees are not in immediate need, they can register remotely with Emergency Social Services (ESS) by phone at 1-800-585-9559.

[BC's Emergency Livestock /Animal Evacuation Group](#) was created for evacuees who need help and for those who are able to offer help.

The Government of Canada and BC Government provide a [variety of supports](#) to ranchers impacted by the wildfires.

[YMCAs](#) across BC (Kamloops, Prince George, Kelowna, Vancouver Island, Vancouver, Surrey) are open to evacuees for showers, rest, and taking part in drop-in programs. ID with photo and home address required to participate.

[Pharmacists](#) are able to provide a drug without a prescription during a state of emergency. The College of Pharmacists of BC [Find a Pharmacy tool](#) helps patients locate a pharmacy in the community they are staying.

[BC Ferries](#) is providing free pre-arranged travel for people evacuating from officially evacuated areas. To book ferry travel, call 1-888-BCFERRY (1-888-223-3779). Evacuees who have already paid for and travelled with BC Ferries can be reimbursed; email receipts and proof of residency in officially evacuated areas to customer.relations@bcferries.com<<mailto:customer.relations@bcferries.com>>.

[BC Parks](#) will honour ESS referral forms (vouchers) that are provided by ESS Reception Centres to evacuees for accommodation.

[Access Pro Bono](#) is providing free legal advice over the phone to anyone displaced by wildfires. Offers free legal help in all areas, including insurance, employment, debt, and tenancy.

[BC Disaster Financial Assistance \(DFA\) Program](#), Emergency Management BC, provides financial assistance to help replace or restore essential items and property after a disaster. Only takes effect once a disaster has been declared eligible by the province. This has not yet happened for these fires, but check website for updates.
